

Gleason's key basket gets Bonner & Prendie revenge on Carroll

UPPER DARBY – Bonner & Prendergast needed somebody to make a shot in the fourth quarter of Tuesday's Catholic League game against Archbishop Prendergast.

The Pandas saw their cozy 15-point advantage at the end of the third quarter, punctuated by a Dakota McCaughan buzzer-beater from beyond the arc, sliced to three points with 1:52 to play in regulation.

Alexis Gleason had been held without a shot in the fourth quarter when she received the ball inside the paint, made a move and laid up an easy deuce with 33.9 left on the clock. It was only one basket, but the Pandas needed someone to right the ship.

“Oh, we wanted it bad,” said Gleason, a junior forward. “We were throwing the ball away and not making good decisions. We really had to calm things down, set our offense up, don’t try to rush. I got the ball and was able (to get the basket). Confidence is a big thing.”

Despite a 26-point performance by Carroll junior Erin Sweeney, Bonner & Prendie held on for a 47-40 victory.

Last season, the Pandas (3-1, 1-0 PCL) lost twice in blowout fashion to the Patriots, once in the regular season and a second time in the Catholic League playoffs. Revenge was on the Pandas’ minds Tuesday night.

“I’ve never beaten them and I’m a senior,” said guard and co-captain Maeve McCann, who had four of her six points in the final quarter. “They’re definitely a really good team and we’ve always wanted to beat them. It’s also a big rival of ours. It’s definitely a win that sets the tone for our season and proves that we’re a different team from last year.”

Sweeney, the team’s second-leading scorer, shouldered the load Monday night for the Patriots, who were without senior forward Harlem Jennings. Sweeney had 11 of Carroll’s 13 points at intermission.

Freshman Grace O'Neill, who is the niece of former Carroll coach Chuck Creighton, finished with six points, including a 3-pointer in the fourth quarter to kickstart the Patriots' 12-0 run. Mary DeSimone hit a pair of treys in the final stanza, but by and large it was the hot shooting of Sweeney that helped keep Carroll (3-3, 1-1) afloat. The do-everything junior drilled a 3-pointer from the elbow to pull Carroll within two points, 41-39, after Gleason's layup.

McCann answered by dribbling the length of the floor and hitting a layup with 40 seconds to go. Carroll threw the ball away on its next possession, which allowed the Pandas to clinch the victory from the foul line.

"We had to stay calm and make sure we kept our energy up," said Bonner & Prendie forward Ariana McGeary, who tallied eight points. "It was a big (win) for us."

McCaughan, the Pandas' exciting junior guard, scored all 11 of her points in the second half. But she was particularly dangerous when setting her teammates up with on-the-money passes. McCaughan led the Pandas with six assists and two steals, and she made four free throws in the waning seconds to seal the win.

Reagan Dolan came off the bench to score six points for the Pandas.

"We're rotating four guards in Dakota, Maeve, Bridie (McCann) and Alexis Eagan. It does keep us pretty fresh," B&P coach Tom Stewart said. "Then we have Reagan Dolan playing for us, a sophomore, who didn't play last year. Then we have McGearry and Gleason, so we have a solid seven this year.

"Towards the end, we kind of lost sight of what we were trying to do defensively. We had to pull it together. No. 22 (Sweeney) is such a good player, she is 5-10 and can shoot the 3. We caught a break because Jennings didn't play. ... It's a big win. Carroll beat us twice last year, so it was good to get one of them back."

Dougherty, O'Neill, Sweeney pace Archbishop Carroll

Karli Dougherty only had one field goal, but it came at just the right time, and Grace O'Neill was calm under pressure at the free throw line as Archbishop Carroll outlasted previously unbeaten Staten Island Academy, 66-63, in double overtime in the second day of the She Got Game Classic in Baltimore.

Trailing by two as time wound down in regulation, Dougherty, a

sophomore, put back an offensive rebound to send the game into overtime. After the teams remain tied through the first overtime, O'Neill, a freshman, hit a pair of clutch free throws in the second extra session to seal the victory. O'Neill finished 6-for-8 from the line.

Junior Erin Sweeney did yeoman's work on offense. The junior hit five 3-point field goals and scored a career-high 36 points to lead the Patriots (3-2 overall, 1-0 Catholic League). Senior guard Mary DeSimone backed Sweeney with 11 points.

Main Line boys' basketball

squads tip off 2018-19 campaign

The 2018-19 Main Line boys' high school basketball season features several strong teams coming off record-setting 2017-18 campaigns, such as Lower Merion, which advanced to the PIAA state tournament for the eighth consecutive year – the longest current streak in PIAA Division 6A.

Gregg Downer, now in his 29th year as Lower Merion head coach, leads a group of Aces who are looking to make more history this winter.

The Aces are off to a 3-0 start this season (as of Wednesday), winning two games in the McDowell Tip Off Tournament in Erie, then defeating Haverford High Tuesday, getting out to a 39-11 halftime lead. In the season opener Dec. 7, the Aces defeated Taylor Allderdice 68-52, then the following day defeated host McDowell, 76-68, in overtime, with 6-5 senior guard Jack Forrest scoring 26 points and winning tournament MVP honors. Lower Merion (24-6 last winter) is a very seasoned team, featuring 11 seniors, five of whom have been with the team for four years. Two of them are 1,000 point scorers – Forrest, and 6-2 point guard Steve Payne, who reached the milestone in the championship game of the McDowell Tip Off Tournament. Both are coming off stellar junior campaigns.

Forrest, who recently committed to Columbia University for basketball, last winter averaged 18.1 ppg and 5.2 rpg for the Central League champions, tied an LM single-season record with 73 treys (40 percent from behind the arc) and received All-Central League first team honors.

Payne, also a first team All-Central League selection last winter, became the first Lower Merion player since Kobe Bryant to lead Aces in all three categories (18.7 ppg, 5.9 rpg, 5.2 apg) in a single season, and made 54 treys while shooting 44 percent from behind the arc.

Unfortunately, the Aces hit a bump in the road a few minutes

into the Tuesday night win against Haverford – Forrest went down with an ankle sprain and is expected to be out for at least a month. Forrest was off to a great start this season, tallying 20 points and 14 rebounds in the season opener, then scoring 26 points in the McDowell Tip Off Tournament championship game.

Without Forrest, the Aces still have a solid senior lineup, including Payne, 6-5 center Josh Martin, 5-11 wing Darryl Taylor, 6-1 guard Julian Hairston, 6-3 guard Matt O'Connor and 6-0 guard Theo Henry. Another 6-0 senior, Villanova football commit Jalen Goodman, is on the squad as well.

Our biggest keys to success include playing excellent team defense, rebounding, and playing up tempo offensively and using our team speed. Our outside shooting is also a strong point, so another key for us is making the extra pass and find the open man for the shot."

through the program and know what is expected. They do a great job leading the younger guys.”

1 4A champions. A fine all-around athlete who is committed to University of Louisville for lacrosse, Scott scored both goals in the Pioneers' District 1 championship game win.

Emily Wertz, Conestoga – Senior outside midfielder and co-captain came back from ACL tears the previous two seasons to provide excellent all-around play for the District 1 4A champions. The Susquehanna University soccer commit tallied 12 goals and dished out six assists.

Anna Salvucci, Episcopal Academy – Senior midfielder, a first team All-Inter-Ac and All-Delco selection, scored 13 goals and dished out nine assists for the PAISAA state champions. University of Connecticut soccer commit has been selected to play in the 2018 High School All-American game.

Raina Kuzemka, Episcopal Academy – Junior midfielder, a first team All-Inter-Ac and All-Delco selection, was an excellent all-around performer, shouldering much of the team's defensive responsibility while contributing offensively (six goals, seven assists) as well.

Olivia Dirks, Episcopal Academy – Senior midfielder/forward and captain, a first team All-Inter-Ac and All-Delco Player of the Year, was the Most Valuable Player of the PAISAA state champions. Selected to play in the 2018 High School All-American game, she will play lacrosse for Penn State University.

One of the main things Haynes worked on this summer was increasing her range and the guard, an all-state pick last year, showed that off by hitting a pair of 3-pointers during her scoring spree.

“I didn’t want to let this win go and I felt like I could dominate where I am right now and I got really passionate about it,” Haynes said. “We’re so strong together and have such a good core. We trust each other, which I love, because we have such good chemistry. People may think because we’re younger, we only have one senior and mostly junior, we may not

be as competitive but we always show up.”

The highlight of the half for Haynes though was her layup after a long inbound pass by Balzer. While her older brother Jon, a senior wide receiver at North Penn, is the family football player, Jaye showed her route running skills on the post pattern and catch as Balzer hit her in stride for two of her 17 points.

“Our coach says we’re a team full of stars and we believe that up and down the bench,” Haynes said. “Lindsay (Putnam) can get hot, Sarah (DiLello) has amazing defense, Maddie (Burns) is so competitive and Becca (Booth) has improve so much. It’s no one person’s team, it’s all of us.”

Carroll made a good adjustment after Balzer’s second quarter spurt by switching Jennings over to guard her. While the senior sharpshooter didn’t score in the third, she blew the game open in the fourth quarter.
